

# July 11-13 - Project Pipeline

Several EOAers volunteered for Project Pipeline with NOMA Nash this year! Project Pipeline is a 3-day design camp for students 6th -12th grade. The students collaborate with architects and designers and are tasked with a series of design challenges addressing scale, community, culture, and context. The camp is not only rewarding for young designers or those curious about design, but also for us as mentors, educators, and listeners guiding young minds to access design at an early age.







### July 23 - Dr. George W. Hubbard House

One of our Architects, Keith Bush, attended a tour of the 1921 Dr. George W. Hubbard House hosted by the Nashville Preservation Society & Historic Hubbard House Foundation. It was announced at the tour that the foundation will be awarded funding from The National Trust for Historic Preservation which will be applied to Phase I of the restoration!

Built in 1921 with donations from the Meharry Medical College alumni and trustees, the Hubbard House served as the retirement home of Dr. George W. Hubbard (1841-1924), a founder and head of Meharry for 44 years. During his tenure, more than one-half of the South's African American physicians, dentists, and pharmacists graduated from Meharry. Designed by local African American architect Moses McKissack and listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973, this building is the last remnant of the original Meharry campus, which relocated to North Nashville in the 1930s. In 1970, the house was converted for use as the parsonage of the Seay-Hubbard United Methodist Church. Currently vacant and in poor condition, plans for restoring the African American historic landmark have stalled, leading to members of the community to worry about its future in the rapidly redevelopment SoBro neighborhood.

### **August 16 - Affordable Housing Conversations**

Burkley Allen, Council Member At Large, Hannah Davis, Senior Manager of Policies and Initiatives, and Travis Miller, Housing Policy and Program Coordinator, met with EOA to discuss affordable housing policy updates. The Housing Division has been dedicated to identifying the causes of housing insecurity and developing effective strategies to address this growing challenge. Numerous, on-going reports and studies emphasize Metro Nashville's urgent need for affordable housing, inclusive communities, and ensuring equitable access to housing. Key programs and initiatives discussed were the BARNES Fund, Catalyst Fund, CHIP, PILOT, and Permit and Departmental Priority Review. The Housing Division has created an Affordable Housing Dashboard to document and track Metro Nashville's affordable housing needs and progress towards meeting those needs.

The main stage this year was occupied by artists from the Black Opry, an organization the focuses on amplification of Black artists, fans, and industry professionals working in country, Americana, blues, folk, or roots music.
